Annual displays at the Gardens

During the growing season, the Gardens are home to over 4,000 annuals. From the tall cannas and elephant ears to the smallest tufts of alyssum on the ground, each plant is just one brush stroke in a giant, ever-changing painting.

When I started working here in August of 2022, the annual beds were in full glory. Even as I marveled at the displays, part of me was already looking forward to plant shopping for next year. Imagine my surprise when I learned that we rarely buy new annual plants. Almost all 4,000 are saved, propagated or grown.

Why let mature, expensive plants die when they can be saved and replanted in the spring? We dig up our large grasses and herbs, divide them, pot them and place them in the greenhouse. We store cannas, elephant ears and sweet potato vine tubers in the basement.

Propagating plants allows us to consistently keep key annual cultivars year after year. Before the first frost, we clip a few long stems from our salvias, lantanas, alternantheras and others. Each stem yields numerous cuttings — just a node and a leaf

are all we need! Not all cuttings flourish, but enough grow to display a range of our best performing annuals.

We get most of the plants we need through our collaboration with the Department of Horticulture & Natural Resources, specifically Kimberly Williams, professor of greenhouse management. She incorporates our annual needs into her course on plant production, and her students grow them from seed or herbaceous cuttings. Some of these seeds and cuttings are the latest All-American Selections winners. Others we buy on our own so we can exhibit a variety of new plants each year. Most seeds are donated to the department for use in Professor Williams' class. Our partnership gives students hands-on experience and puts the results of their work on display in the Gardens.

I'm very excited about this year's annuals. We're expanding our display to the old conservatory site, and we have an incredible lineup of interesting new plants for all to enjoy.


