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Introduction

Kansas State University

Kansas State University is a community of 3,600-plus faculty and staff and nearly 20,000 students from every state and many countries. K-State was founded in 1863 as the nation's first operational land-grant university, and now has campuses in Manhattan, Salina, and Olathe, as well as our Global Campus, which serves thousands of distance students.

K-State students can choose from more than 250 majors and options in nine colleges, and more than 165 academic programs in the Graduate School. Research opportunities abound for both undergraduate and graduate students, as K-State is home to more than 90 research centers and laboratories.

English Language Program

The English Language Program is a CEA-accredited program with faculty who hold advanced degrees in TESL or related fields. The ELP is also a member of Education USA and UCIEP (the Consortium of University and College Intensive English Programs). The ELP is committed to quality instruction for both undergraduate and graduate students. The ELP offers five levels of intensive English classes, support courses, and courses designed for special programs. ELP advisors help students with academic, social, and personal issues. The ELP collaborates and works closely with departments on campus to provide transition support for ELP students as they move into their academic programs.

Preparations for this Program

Visit your doctors before departure!

In the United States, health care is expensive. Even if you have insurance, you will have some expenses if you need to go to the doctor. Therefore, we suggest that you visit your family physician and have a check-up before your departure. Also, most travel insurance does not cover dental care. Visit your dentist and have all your dental problems taken care of before you travel.

Vaccination Records

- 1. K-State requires all international students to complete a **Tuberculosis (TB)** screening form. We will give you the form after you arrive. Please be prepared to fill it out and return it the same day.
- 2. Bring your vaccination records proving that you received two doses of **MMR (measles, mumps, rubella) vaccination.** Your records should be translated into English.
- 3. Bring your records proving that you received **meningococcal immunization**. If you did not receive it, you will fill out a waiver form during orientation.

What to Pack

Clothing and Weather

Manhattan and Kansas have a continental climate. Summer days can be very hot and humid. The morning temperature is around 60-70 F (18-20°C). The hottest part of the day is usually 5:00 pm, when the temperature can be above 100 F (38 °C). Therefore, most rooms and buildings are air-conditioned, where the temperature is kept at around 72-75 F (22 - 24°C). Thunderstorms occur frequently, mostly in the evening. People usually wear comfortable casual or semiprofessional clothes on campus. It is advisable to wear modest clothing. Based on the information about the local weather, please bring:

- Clothes that you can wear in warm weather: clothes made of thin cotton, shorts, T-shirts, short-sleeve shirts, skirts. Jeans are acceptable.
- Footwear that is comfortable for walking. (You will need to walk 15 minutes from your housing to the classroom.)
- A light raincoat or umbrella.

Health Care Items

1. Pack your prescription medication and over-the-counter medication

You should bring all the prescription medication you need for your stay because you might not be able to get the same medication in the USA. When travelling, you should have a valid prescription or a doctor's note written in English with the medication. The medication must be in its original packaging.

Also bring the over-the-counter medication that you take regularly (for example painkillers or headache medication). Your insurance does not cover over-the-counter medication. <u>https://www.fda.gov/ForConsumers/ConsumerUpdates/ucm484154.htm</u>

2. Bring an extra pair of glasses

Most insurance policies do not cover eye exams and glasses. Bring an extra pair of glasses if possible.

Documents and Passwords

Most importantly, bring all the official documentation from IIE, CAPES, and K-State, including invitation letters and immigration documents. Write all your email addresses with the passwords and other passwords on a piece of paper and keep the records with you in your **carry-on luggage**. Don't forget to pack your password!

Important: Prior departure, check your airlines' weight and size baggage restrictions!

After your arrival, you will have the opportunity to go shopping for school supplies and personal hygiene items and even summer clothes. (You will receive your course books, but you need to have your own paper, pens, pencils, and notebook.)

Arriving at the Airport

A welcome team will be waiting for you at your flight exit at the Kansas City International Airport (MCI). They will hold a sign so that you can recognize them. A charter bus will drive you to Manhattan and help you get settled in your room on campus.

Welcome to Manhattan!

Manhattan is situated in the Flint Hills region of Kansas. As the name indicates, this area has rolling hills and you can find the largest uncultivated prairie of North America here. Kansas is also called the Bread Basket of the USA because it produces the largest amount of wheat. Manhattan has a population of 56,000 people. Two major institutions employ most of the people: Kansas State University (KSU) and Fort Riley US Army base. Kansas State University has about 20,000 students. Fort Riley is a large army base about 10 miles (15 kilometers away) from the city, and it is home to about 9,000 soldiers.

Accommodations

The K-State Housing and Dining Services welcomes you to Marlatt Hall and the Derby and Kramer Dining Centers! Here is some information to help you get settled in your room.

During your program, you will stay in a university dormitory room with beds and desks. You will share the room with 1 other PDPI participant of the same gender, with community bathrooms. The residence halls provide a wireless internet connection. It is recommended that you discuss basic courtesy rules with your roommates when you move in to help you acclimate to the new living arrangements and to avoid conflicts. In the USA, quiet hours are usually between 10:00 pm and 7:00 am.

Family members are not permitted to join you at this program.

Meals

During most of your program, you will have your meals in Kramer Dining Center, which is the closest dining center to Marlatt. Beginning July 28, you will eat your meals in Derby Dining Center, located on the opposite side of campus. Your card will serve as a meal card that you can use once for each meal. The food plan includes 3 meals a day Monday through Saturday, and 2 meals on Sunday (no evening meal.) Meals are served 'buffet' style, or, all-you-care-to-eat. Usually you will find a choice of main dish, vegetables, salads, breads, desserts and beverages. There is always a choice of 2 or 3 meat or meatless entrees. Vegetarian options are always available. Vegan options are often available. The program will provide cash for you to use for Sunday evening meals and meals on cultural trips away from the university.

Transportation

ATA (Flint Hills Area Transportation Services) provides transportation services on campus and in the city. With your bus pass, you can ride the bus during your program for free.

- The ATA Shuttle connects the campus to the city through a loop that operates from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Saturday. You can ride the shuttle at any of these stops, in this order:
 - Jardine Apartments (between Frith Community Center and Cornerstone Coffee
 - K-State Union on campus
 - Aggieville (south east corner of campus, mini-town strip of restaurants, coffee shops, and stores)
 - Manhattan Town Center Mall and Downtown
 - Dollar Tree
 - Walmart

- 2. Park 'n' Ride ATA Bus Route connects the dining center and Jardine apartments through a loop that operates from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. You can catch the shuttle at any of these stops, in this order:
 - Jardine Complex: between the Frith Community Center and Cornerstone Coffee
 - Lafene Health Center (across the street from the west side residence halls and Kramer).
 - K-State Union
 - McCain Auditorium (and Fairchild Hall English Language Program)
 - Holton Hall (Hale Library and coffee shop is right behind Holton)
 - Justin Hall
 - Derby Dining Center and Leadership Studies
 - Leadership Studies
 - Call Hall
 - Recreation Center
 - East Stadium

3. ATA Shuttles in Manhattan

There are other routes offered during the week, and there are no buses on Sunday. Each route has a color signal. The buses stop at the designated bus stops and run according to a fixed schedule. There are no shuttle rides on Sunday. You can view routes online at the sites above, and you can download the TRANSIT app on your phone

4. Traveling with K-State Vans

During your stay, ELP staff members and Student Ambassadors will drive you in KSU vans to scheduled cultural activities and fieldtrips. All the drivers have special van certification. Some trips will be taken by school bus or charter bus.

5. Traveling during Free Weekends

Important Traffic Rules in Manhattan:

- Always buckle your seatbelt when you travel by car, even if you are a passenger.
- Texting and talking on the phone is forbidden while driving.
- Driving under the influence of alcohol is forbidden.

Health Insurance and Health Care Services in Manhattan

You will have CISI Health insurance provided by IIE. This insurance is accepted by many physicians in the area and by the emergency clinics. Also, you can visit the university's Lafene Health Center in case you have to visit a general practitioner.

Even though you have health insurance, you need to pay copayments, deductibles, and out-of-pocket expenses. As mentioned above, your insurance might not cover dental care, vision care, and over-the-counter medication.

What to do if you get sick?

1. If you catch a cold, you can buy over-the-counter medication. Major stores (Wal-Mart, Target, Dillons, Hy-Vee, Walgreens) have pharmacies. Over-the-counter medications are **not** covered by insurance.

2. Lafene Health Center:

If you get sick during the week, and you need to see a doctor, you should make an appointment with the university's student health care center. While making the call, you should tell your symptoms openly so that you can see the doctor as soon as possible. If you are hesitant to call a doctor, ask Katie or other staff members for assistance.

3. Urgent Care Clinics

If you need to see a doctor in the evening or during the weekend, you can choose to visit an urgent care facility. These facilities are cheaper than hospital emergency care. They are open till 7:00 pm daily except on Sundays (till 6:00 pm)

Wi-Fi access will be available in nearly all campus buildings, so it may still be possible to send and receive messages on your mobile device when it is connected to the Internet without purchasing any additional services. Academic Program

You will participate in three different courses as part of your program, as well as meet in small groups and individually with faculty mentors. The courses and mentoring component were designed to meet the program requirements. The program requires 180 hours of coursework and activities. Therefore, you must attend the classes, work on assignments, and participate in school visits and workshops to receive the program certificate. If you are ill or have had an accident, contact Katie Barkley and notify your teachers.

U.S. History and Culture through Film

With all the PDPI participants, you will watch films set in different periods of U.S. history and related to different aspects of U.S. culture that shape present day politics and education. This is an integrated skills course, so you will study new vocabulary and read about historical periods and cultural topics that support the viewing experience and help you learn content. You will be encouraged to reflect on how the historical and cultural content could be integrated into your own English courses.

Oral Communication Skills

You will improve your pronunciation, listening, and communication skills by listening to and discussing various topics related to U.S. history and culture. Oral fluency and presentation skills necessary for classroom situations will be emphasized. Two sections of this course will be offered.

Pedagogical Applications

This course addresses a range of educational concepts and teaching strategies (e.g., backward planning, cooperative learning, digital tools, etc.), and allows participants to develop and practice implementing these approaches in their own classrooms. Additionally, learners hone the language skills required to introduce a lesson topic, communicate expectations, and conduct class activities—as well as conversational moves instructors use as they carry out typical teaching, assessment, and classroom management routes. Activities include school tours and conversations with teachers and administrators.

Principles of Learning & Teaching

This course highlights the application of psychological principles to the teaching and learning process, with a special emphasis on principles of learning, motivation, information processing, individual differences, and assessment. Participants in this course will obtain practical experiences that are related to classroom organization, management, learning activities, and adolescent development—including how technology can assist teachers and learners (originating with a review of <u>ISTE standards</u>).

Homeroom

This time, following lunch most days, will be used to share updates to the schedule, answer questions, and give you time to work on homework.
